

# Twin Bridges hosts District 11-C

Class "C" girls basketball action last weekend saw area teams win only two of six contests.

Sheridan defeated West Yellowstone 55-38 Friday, but was turned back 45-33 Saturday by Townsend. Lima was defeated 52-30 Friday by Harrison, but rebounded with a dramatic 36-35 win over West Yellowstone Saturday. Twin Bridges dropped two games, Friday 45-40 to White Sulphur Springs, and a 70-61 contest Saturday to Three Forks.

Sheridan broke open a close game with West Yellowstone in the second quarter, and held off a third quarter rally by the Wolverines for the victory.

Danette Day and Kelly Ludwick scored 17 points each,

while Tracy Smith added 12 in a balanced scoring attack.

Against Townsend the Panthers matched the Lady Bulldogs point-for-point in the first period, but were outscored 29-13 in the middle quarters. Sheridan rallied in the fourth quarter, but it was a case of too little, too late.

Day again pumped in 17 points for the Panthers.

Lima started the game against Harrison ice cold and fought to get back in the game the entire evening. The Bears did not score in the first quarter and found themselves in a 29-11 hole at the half. The Wildcats broke the game wide open in the third quarter and cruised to the victory.

The Bears were led by Stacey

Olsen with 14 points.

The Bears were victorious Saturday night as Becky Palmer buried a jump shot with five seconds left to give Lima the heart-stopping win.

The Bears rallied from a 20-14 halftime deficit to post the victory.

Tammi Huntsman led the Bears with 13 points, while Olsen added 11 points. Palmer was also credited with 13 rebounds.

The Twin Bridges Falcons found themselves in a real shoot-out with Three Forks Saturday night. The run-and-gun contest saw the Wolves ahead by a slim 20-19 score after one period. The second period continued to resemble a track meet as the

Wolves took a 40-34 lead into the locker room at the half.

The game was decided in the third quarter as Three Forks raced to a 61-41 lead after three periods of play. A late fourth quarter rally by the Falcons came up just a little short.

Three Falcons scored in double figures in the game. Elyn McAlear scored 19 points, followed by 17 from Amy Phillips and 13 points from Leslie Perry. Perry also pulled down 17 rebounds.

Results of the Twin Bridges/White Sulphur Springs game were not available at press time.

Sheridan, Lima, and Twin Bridges will compete in the District 11-C Tournament to be held in Twin Bridges Nov. 9-11.

lice) to use. It's kind of a sparkplug to make them go out and contact the kids."

"I just can't imagine why kids should be out at 2 a.m.," Pryor said.

Noting there is a statute in the state law that gives the county commissioners the authority to set a curfew, Pryor said he would contact the county attorney concerning the validity of the city's curfew statute. "If he says no, I won't do it," Pryor said.

The police chief also explained there is an alternative way to handle the problem, other than the curfew. "Field interrogation can be used. That's asking people if they've seen or heard anything."

"We're not there to harass, just to get information," Pryor said.

Loose dogs will also be a target for increased police attention.

Because neither Dillon nor Beaverhead County has an actual animal shelter or pound, officers are being instructed to chase stray dogs home. Officers will then contact the owners and issue citations, Pryor said.

Arrangements have been made to place dogs at a local veterinarian, limited by space available. Dogs will be held five days if they appear to be healthy, then destroyed. Owners claiming their animals will have to pay a boarding charge of \$27.40, Pryor said.

"Judge Lynch will fine the owners \$25 for the first offense, \$50 for the second and \$100 for the third time," Pryor added.

"My orders are to handle the dog problem the best I can. There are very little funds, about \$300, which will take care of 10 dogs. I've already spent a third of my budget in a couple of weeks."

"I would love to see a Humane Society," Pryor noted. "I would even take healthy dogs to Butte if that was necessary."

Pryor has recently had a warning letter printed that gives motorists 24 hours to correct a variety of parking problems. Included in the list of violations are parking on the wrong side of the road and abandoned vehicles. Flagrant violations, such as parking by a fire hydrant will bring an immediate ticket. Also included in the violations that will bring a first time warning is taking two parking places and parking in alleys. Work is also being done, by the city council, on an ordinance prohibiting parking in a handicapped zone without a proper license plate or card.

The police will also enforce the open container law, Pryor said, except on occasions when

special permits are issued.

He is instructing his officers to pay special attention to drivers whose ability may be impaired through alcohol. "He's the guy who thinks he can drive well and he's the one who causes a lot of accidents."

Pryor is encouraging citizens to call the police if they observe someone driving in a hazardous manner. "We need the license number and vehicle description, and the caller can remain anonymous," Pryor said.

Police will continue to patrol school zones, especially when school is starting or letting out. Because of the secondary state highway that passes the high school, the area is not zoned, something Pryor says he will try to correct. He warned drivers to be especially careful around the high school, since students go in and out every hour. "We really need a light there," Pryor said.

Although Dillon does not appear to have a major drug problem, it is definitely present, Pryor said, estimating that there are about six people providing drugs, principally marijuana and cocaine, to friends. "Each one furnishes from seven to 10

people," Pryor said.

"Because friends don't turn each other in, we have to catch them in the act or buy or sell to them. And they know every cop in town," Pryor said, explaining the difficulty in prosecution.

His first priority, and something he has been working hard on since he arrived in Dillon, is "getting the operations of the department going."

That includes increased training for officers. "We've started to have training come here. More can be trained if we bring it to Dillon." Much of the training, Pryor said, is available at low cost, or even free, through the Federal Marshall and the FBI.

Having served nearly 20 years in law enforcement in Wyoming, most recently as undersheriff of Converse County at Douglas, Pryor noted he was especially impressed by Montana's juvenile system. The Children's Protection Agency, which includes the local sheriff, police, mental and family services, meet regularly to discuss juvenile problems and how to handle them. "Invariably the kid comes out on top," Pryor said. "He gets protected by it."

# County to redistrict using 1980 census

The county commissioners are going to comply with an order from the District Court to redistrict Beaverhead County as to commissioner districts.

Randy Tommerup, chairman of the Beaverhead County Commissioners, said Monday the county will redistrict the county based on the 1980 census figures.

District Judge Frank Davis had earlier ordered the redistricting in a writ of mandamus.

"We'll try to divide the county in relation to area and population. It could be interesting, but hopefully not too difficult," Tommerup said.

The county will be the center of the "pie," Tommerup said. Each district will radiate from the courthouse. "It's the only way we can do it," he said.

One area that will need to be investigated, Tommerup said, is the relationship of Western Montana College students.

"I hope we can follow natural

landmarks," he said, "but we're not sure we can do that."

Although the commissioners are elected at large, they must reside within the district they were elected from, Tommerup said.

Later Monday evening the commissioners joined the Dillon City council for their second joint meeting since beginning the sessions earlier this fall.

On the agenda was a presentation from State Rep. and director of the Beaverhead Economic Development Corporation Chuck Swygood.

Swygood outlined the availability of federal Title IX funds, for which Beaverhead County is eligible because of the impact of reduced employment at Stoltz

Lumber and Montana Cubes.

Those funds, Stoltz said, are available on a matching basis, usually 50-50, and must be used for economic development that will create jobs similar to those that were originally lost.

Both the city and county approved using existing economic development research as a basis for the county's strategy planning, which will allow an earlier application of funds, Swygood said.

Among the projects suggested as possibly eligible for funding would be an industrial park, certain public work projects, including water development, and the use of the old Barrett Hospital Building for either private or public development.

## Social Security benefits increase

The Social Security Administration has announced that people receiving Social Security benefits and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments will receive a 4.7 percent increase in their payments in January 1990, according to Butte Social Security Manager, Paul F. Vang.

This cost of living expense is based on increases in the Consumer Price Index from September 1988 to September 1989, and, according to Vang, is tied to the Social Security law which mandates that Social Security and SSI benefits will keep pace with inflation.
