PVA Funday & CARNIVAL

Pony rides, and cake walks, dancing and face painting, duck-dunking, marble-shooting, cookie-eating, and sawdust rummaging were only a few of the many activities, and games on offer at the Parkview Acres Care and Rehabilitation Center Carnival and Funday, held last Friday.

The event was timed to coincide with National Rehabilitation Week, which took place between September 14 and 20. According to Kitty Griffin, Director of Rehab at the Center, the week is a way to recognize the efforts of the people who both work in or who benefit from the various forms of rehabilitation therapy.

She explained that the emphasis this year was on the Parkview Acres' Pediatric Program. Information was available on all of the Center's kid-related services, including child development, screening, and occupational, physical and speech therapy.

"It's also a nice way for the community to be informed of what we can offer here in the way of therapists and the variety of services," said Griffin.

Currently she explained, the Center has 14 licensed therapists and three rehab aids. "We have grown quite a bit over the last four years," she said, citing the center's external contracts with Homehealth, Barrett Hospital, the nursing home in Sheridan and the schools system.

Also in attendance Friday was Dorothy Dettart, Director of Occupational Therapy. She brought along some friends, including Obe Wan Kenobe, the Llama, a large black sheep, and an outrageously friendly pair of goats. She explained that she is currently trying to train the Obe and the others to come into the facility. "It's so therapeutic for people to be able to touch these gentle creatures," she said. The animals are so accepting, and are blind to disability and age. They are good ambassadors."



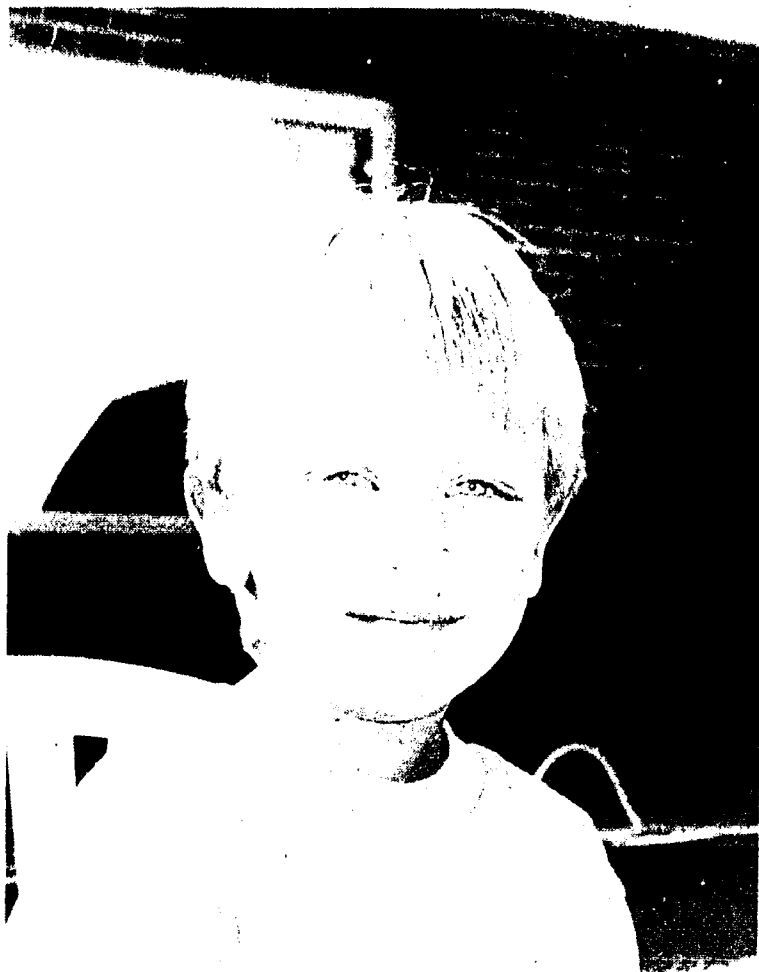
