E.M.C.O.E. DEBATE TEAM RUNNER-UP IN TOURNEY

Eastern was runner-up in the finals in the intercollegiate forensic tournament at Carroll College on Friday, April 9.

Frank Gonzales and Dean Jellison of M.S.U. defeated E.M.C.O.E.'s June Berg and John Adams in the finals. The subject was Federal Aid to Education.

Each school was represented by two teams. Selection for the finals was by elimination in four preliminary bouts. By winning in the preliminaries a team was eligible for the semi-finals.

Next Friday the Northwestern Debate Tournament will be held at Missoula with twenty-five schools participating. June Berg of White Sulphur Springs, JoAnn Cusick of Butte, John Adams of Billings and Bob Sando of Mildren will represent Eastern at the meet. The squad is coached by Mr. Ray Harshfield, Director of Speech Arts at Eastern.

HEDLEY HEPWORTH FEATURES ASSEMBLY PROGRAM English Star Nationally Known

Mr. Hedley Hepworth, internationally known interpreter of Charles Dickens, was featured in last Wednesday's assembly. During the war Mr. Hepworth employed his gift for impersonation aiding the British Secret Service.

On this his seventh trans-continental tour, he is presenting a program from his inexhaustible store of characters based on the works of Charles Dickens. His ability in make-up and costume change has ranked him as one of Britain's foremost interpreter's of Dickens.

Mr. Hepworth has filled engagements in practically every state in the United States and all of the Canadian provinces. His services are in great demand in radio and television.

His appearance as a guest star on many top-notch shows has made him a nationally known figure.

Both students and faculty members have been looking forward with anticipation to the completion of the new science building on the campus of Eastern. This building is to house the departments of biology, zoology, botany, chemistry, physics and geology, which have been operating temporarily in the administration building, pending completion of the new structure.

Plans for this new and modern structure began shortly after the coming of Dr. A. G. Peterson to Eastern. He consulted with faculty members and immediately considered the plans for the new buildings. Professor William Hoheisal has been in on the plans from the start and has contributed a great deal. Under the post-war building plans for the State of Montana, a consulting architect, together with the faculty members, worked out the preliminary plans. Working with Professor Hoheisal and Dr. Peterson have been Oliver W. Peterson, G. H. Gloege, Keith Manion and Richard Meens. Funds were allocated through the post-war building fund and by direct appropriation of the 1947 Legislative Assembly.

Chandler C. Cohagen of Billings, Montana, was selected as the architect. Contract for the building was awarded to the Boespflug Construction Co. of Billings.
