Noted Speaker to Appear During Activity Hour Rescheduled for Nov. 7

Acclaimed by the press as "one of the most sought-after inspirational speakers in America," Ian Stuart, community relations director for Florists Telegraph Delivery, will present a timely message, "The Miracle of America," to Eastern students Friday, Nov. 7, at 11 a. m.

The 11 a. m. Tuesday activity period will be canceled and a free hour at the same time Friday will take its place to accommodate Stuart's busy tour schedule. Classes that meet during this hour on Friday will be excused and arrangements made for make-up sessions Tuesday during the canceled activity hour, L. W. Veraldi announced.

An Irishman, full of Irish wit and spine-tingling philosophy, Ian Stuart is claimed the only man who has held executive school posts in three countries: England, Ireland, and the United States. Stuart probably addresses more students than any man alive and is often tagged "The Flying Schoolmaster."

A graduate of the University of Dublin, he took top honors in history, political science and economics. He taught at St. Paul's School, London, and Harrow School, where he introduced rugby football. He is one of the few British athletes who holds the equivalent of our All-American in two sports, track and rugby football.

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
