New English Course Offered In Spring

Pre-professional students at Eastern will get a chance to learn how to write reports and other technical writing forms in a new course to be offered the spring quarter by the English department, it was revealed today.

The course will be English 235 and it is offered for the first time on this campus. Professor J. Bobbitt, former technical publications editor for General Electric, will teach the three hour course. Pre-requisites are the basic freshman composition courses.

Bobbitt said the course is designed primarily for the pre-professional student or any student who wants report making techniques developed. Writing the descriptive, interpretive and informative report as well as abstracts will be explained. They won't be just writing about plays and poems but rather reports like "how to take blood pressure" and other practical expository methods, he said.
