On Tuesday, November, 15, at 7:30, at the Community Hall a group of Family Affairs Month speakers will speak before the Community Club members and all who are interested.

The purpose of the Family Affairs Month is to urge the head of every household to plan for his family's future financial security and for his own retirement. The four professions concerned with financial planning are staging the event.

A team of speakers composed of an attorney, banker, insurance man and certified public accountant will be available to the organization without charge. The program will be from 20 to 35 minutes, depending on the number of questions.

Speakers will answer questions such as, "How can you know what your retirement income will be - over and above social security? What part will your insurance income play in your retirement income? 'Are you insured to value? Have you made a will? Should your wife have a will? Will the value of your estate be reduced by lack of tax planning? Are you taking all of your income tax deductions that you are permitted to take?"

Speakers are well qualified and their talks will contain valuable information for you and your fam-

ily. This is one phase of the program on the family that the Community Club will be presenting this year.
