## MINING IN LEHIGH COUNTY.

Indian Creek and Blackbird creeks Looking Up.

Some very fine samples of ore from the Indian creek mining district in Idaho were exhibited at the Kenyon hotel yesterday afternoon by A. H. Stearns, N. O. Starling and John Pilling, three well known mining operators at Salmon City, says the Salt Lake Herald of the 11th. The specimens were taken from the Kitty Burton mine, owned by Frank Bach, Messrs. Marising and Pilling have been working the property during the past summer, and met with considerable success in operating an arrastre. A ledge of \$80 ore has been disclosed in the mine, and they state the property is now sufficiently developed to warrant the erection of a stamp mill next year, which will probably be done early in the spring.

Mr. Stearns is interested with a crowd of New York capitalists owning the Ulysses group, upon which a new five-stamp mill was completed and put into commission a few weeks ago. Mr. Stearns states that the mine has developed an eight-foot body of ore, averaging 50 to the ton. The ore can be milled quite cheaply, and preparations are being made to put in five more stamps, so that no less than ten will be dropping by the latter part of May next.

Mr. Stearns left for New York

last night, expecting to remain there for about three months, when he will return to take active charge of the development of the mine. The Ulysses mill is the first one erected in the Indian creek district, but within another year, Mr. Stearns says, he expects to see several more completed in the camp. He believes the year of 1900 will witness the greatest activity ever shown in the Salmon river country.

The Blackbird district is developing some good mines.

All the camps around Salmon are doing well, and people up there generally believe the country will have to wait much longer for a line of railroad. Surveyors have been over the ground during the last few months, and mine owners have guaranteed a sufficient tonnage to make it an object to capitalists to build the line into Salmon City.

## Jones Will Make a Noise.

At 2 o'clock next Monday the Lake Power company expects to have an explosion to break 40,000 cubic yards of granite at Vesuvius outlet, on West Beaver creek, Teller county, Colo., says the Salt Lake Tribune.

A mass of boulders in the way of the construction of a steel trestle across the canyon will be organized and the company fears that the explosion will be interesting to those glorying in the science of engineering and exciting to those who like fun. Therefore invitations have been sent out requesting prominent persons to be present at a probable safe distance of about a mile from "Dam Site" to participate in the explosion. Those invited are requested to bring their kinestoscopes and accident policies. At St. Jones, formerly of this city, is the engineer.

There will be 30,000 pounds of explosives ignited at the same instant and it will be the largest premeditated explosion on record in the United States, excepting that at Hell Gate. Photographs will be taken at the time of and after the explosion.

## Easy Money.

Chicago, Dec. 12.—Walter T. Heber, arrested here to day charged with using the mails for fraudulent purposes, confessed before United States Commissioner Hempfrey that he had grown wealthy through his swindling operations. Postoffice Inspector Stuart has received scores of complaints, mostly from women, which indicate that Heber operated through the mails in every part of the country. He advertised extensively to send 500 samples of silk and other articles upon receipt of 25 cents. As an extra inducement

be guaranteed to reproduce in oil photographs sent him by customers. When arrested numerous photographs were found and his mail on the day of his capture contained \$200 in sums from 25 cents to \$3.
