

Notice of Contest

Spencer has wholly abandoned said land for more than six months last past; that he has never established residence upon said land; that he has never erected or maintained a house or any improvements on said land.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken by this office as having been confessed by you, and your said entry will be cancelled thereunder without your further right to be heard therein, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically meeting and responding to these allegations of contest, or if you fail within that time to file in this office due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail. If this service is made by the delivery of a copy of your answer to the contestant in person, proof of such service must be either the said contestant's written acknowledgement of his receipt of the copy, showing the date of its receipt, or the affidavit of the person by whom the delivery was made stating when and where the copy was delivered; if made by registered mail, proof of such service must consist of the affidavit of the person by whom the copy was mailed stating when and the post office to which it was mailed, and this affidavit must be accompanied by the postmaster's receipt for the letter.

You should state in your answer the name of the post office to which you desire future notices to be sent to you.

Council Resolution No. 4

A resolution authorizing and directing the town treasurer of the town of Baker, Montana, to transfer said moneys in the contingent fund and fire fund to the general fund and police and fire fund respectively.

1
That the town treasurer of the town of Baker, Montana, be and is hereby authorized and directed to transfer any and all moneys now in the contingent fund of said town of Baker, or which may hereafter come into said contingent fund from any cause whatsoever, to the general fund of said city.

2
That the town treasurer of the town of Baker, Montana, be and is hereby authorized and directed to transfer from the fire fund of said town of Baker any and all moneys now to the credit of said fund or which may hereafter come into said fund from any source whatsoever, to the police and fire fund of said city.

3
That the town treasurer of the town of Baker, Montana, be and is hereby authorized and directed to pay any and all warrants drawn on and designated as on the contingent fund out of the moneys which may be to the credit of the general fund of said city and that the said town treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to pay out of the police and fire fund any and all warrants which may be presented on the fire fund of said town of Baker out of the police and fire fund.

Ordinance No. 42

An ordinance amending Sec. 3 and Sec. 4, and repealing Sec. 5 and Sec. 10, of Ordinance No. 25, of the ordinances of the town of Baker, Montana, entitled: "An ordinance providing for the distribution of town revenues into funds, and providing for the payment of current expenses and indebtedness."

Be it ordained by the town council of the town of Baker, Montana

1
That Sec. 3 of ordinance No. 25 of the ordinances of the town of Baker, Montana, be amended so as to read as follows:
Section 3. The general fund of said city shall consist of all moneys received from taxes levied for the current fiscal year to defray the expenses of the Executive Department of said city and to provide for contingent and miscellaneous expense of said city and that all moneys from each and every license of every nature, description and kind other than retail licenses granted by said city and all such other moneys as may from time to time be transferred to the said fund by resolution of the City Council.

2
That Sec. 4 of ordinance No. 25 of the ordinances of the town of Baker, Montana, be amended so as to read as follows:
Section 4. The police and fire fund of said city shall consist of all moneys received from taxes levied for the current fiscal year to defray the expenses of the police and fire department of said city and all moneys received by the said city as fines and penalties for the violation of the ordinances of the said town and all moneys received by said town for liquor licenses and all such other moneys as may from time to time be transferred by resolution of the said Town Council.

3
That Sec. 5 and Sec. 10 of ordinance No. 25 of the ordinances of the town of Baker, Montana, be and the same are hereby repealed.

That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
