

### Chinaman Must Hang For Killing Woman

HELENA, June 26.—Louis Won lost his appeal to the state supreme court in Helena when judgment and order of the Silver Bow county court was affirmed. Won must go to the gallows for shooting and killing Peter Pavlic, April 19, 1925, in a Butte rooming house where white women and Chinamen gathered.

According to evidence brought out at the trial Pavlic, operator of the rooming house, interfered when the Chinaman was choking a woman, boosted him out of the door and three minutes later was shot three times in the head and neck when the Oriental returned for revenge. The Chinaman also fired twice at Elsie Brown, who answered screams during the fuss. He was captured in a coal bin after the murder.

Pavlic was shot and killed on the stairway at 7 West Arizona street at midnight, Elsie Brown, a roomer, declared she saw the shooting and identified Won as the gunman. A short time before she had heard screams

from the room of Dolly Drury and found Won choking her. Pavlic threw the Chinaman out.

Miss Brown said the Chinaman came back soon, started up the stairs and Pavlic started down. The Chinaman fired three shots and she saw Pavlic fall. Then he fired at her as she ran away.

Won was found in a coal cellar in the basement of a Chinese laundry. He was poorly dressed when found and had no mustache as had the man who is said to have done the shooting. He claimed that boys had chased him when he was on his way home, and that he decided to sleep in the coal hole.

He claimed not to understand English though the man who shot Pavlic was said to have spoken in that tongue. Nevertheless Won was identified by the woman as the man who did the shooting and was convicted and sentenced to be hanged. He says he is 20 years old.

### Aimee Believes The Devil Buncoed Her

LOS ANGELES, June 27.—Aimee Semple McPherson today laid her

troubles—her alleged abduction at Ocean Park five weeks ago—at the door of the devil.

Delivering at the afternoon service her first sermon at Angelus temple since her return there after being found at Agua Prieta, Mex., last Wednesday, the noted exponent of the "four square gospel" declared before a densely massed congregation of 7,500 persons that because of her unyielding stand on moral questions the devil had plotted her destruction and had caused the experience which on previous occasions she said that she would not have gone through "for a million dollars."

Relating how she had taken a stand against dance halls, the drug ring and the teaching of evolution and favored prohibition, the evangelist said: "And so he (the devil) finally said: 'If I could just get hold of Sister McPherson, if I could just get her away, that thing would crumble.' Some months ago, the newspapers of our city came out saying that there was a plot—that two people were to be kidnaped. One was a motion picture actress, very well known—I need not mention her name; the other was Aimee McPherson. I laughed at it at the time and threw down the newspapers saying: 'They

would have a hard time getting me.' 'Now I realize that even then the devil was laying his plans.'

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
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
