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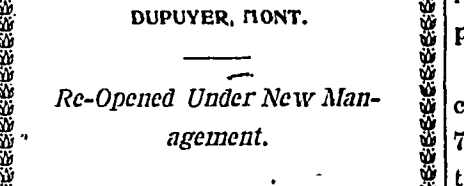

Synopsis of Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners of Teton County, Montana--Special June Meeting, 1902.

Choteau, Mont., June 23, 1902.
Board met at 10 o'clock A. M., at the office of the county clerk. Present: Chairman C. B. Perkins, Commissioner Wm. M. Foster and the Clerk.
Proposal of Prince & Dean for building an extension of Dupuyer bridge for the sum of \$602.50, was presented, it being the only proposal received. Same was accepted.

Petition was presented for new road beginning at the northwest corner of lot 2, section 6, township 28 north, range 6 west, thence south to the southwest corner of the southwest qr of southeast qr section 7, said t'p. W. Matthews, E. A. Savory and J. W. Quail were appointed viewers.
Report of viewers of roads as follows were presented, and the board fixed July 24, 1902, as the day for the hearing of evidence and proofs from all parties interested for and against the proposed roads and the approval or rejection of the viewers reports:

New roads beginning at northeast corner of section 25, township 25 north, range 5 west, thence west about four miles to intersection with Choteau and Dupuyer road.
Change in Choteau and Dupuyer road beginning at southeast corner of section 7, township 25 north, range 5 west, thence west forty rods, thence north forty rods, thence west forty rods, thence north to intersection of same road near center of section 6 said township, that portion of old road lying between intersecting points to be abandoned.
New roads beginning at southeast corner of northwest quarter of section 7, township 25 north, range 5 west, thence west eighty rods, thence north forty rods on township line, thence due west to intersection with Choteau and Blackleaf road.

Change in Dupuyer and Sheep Creek Canyon road beginning at the northeast corner of southeast qr of southeast qr section 8, township 28 north, range 7 west, thence west one mile, thence southwest about three-fourths mile to the center of the northern boundary of the southeast qr of northwest qr of section 18, said township, thence due west one mile, thence southeasterly about three-fourths mile to intersections of same road.
Change in Choteau and Sun River road beginning in the southeast qr of section 25, township 23 north range 4 west, thence northwesterly to a point near the Cascade Land Company's Canal, thence westerly to a point near the quarter corner on the west boundary of section 22, said township and range, thence northwesterly to intersections with same road near southwest corner of section 16, said township and range.
Adjoined to 2 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
Board re-assembled at 2 P. M., same members present.
Petition was presented for change in Dupuyer, Cowell and Birch Creek road beginning at northwest corner of northeast qr of southeast qr section 4, township 28 north, range 7 west, thence due north to the township line at the northwest corner of Lot 1, said section, thence east along the t'pline to intersection with same road. W. Matthews, E. A. Savory and J. W. Quail were appointed viewers.
Final hearing on change in Willow Rounds and Shelby road and on road in vicinity of Smith's and McPhee's ranches, was continued to July 24, 1902.

There being no non-consenting land owners or damages to be awarded, the reports of viewers on following roads were approved, roads declared public highways and ordered opened, and county surveyor was directed to survey and plat same:
Change in Choteau and Bellevue road, beginning at station No. 39 of said road, thence east to section line between sections thirty-four and thirty-five, township 24 north, range 5 west, thence north to a point on said section line two hundred and eighty four feet south of section corner common to sections 27 and 35 of said township, thence northeast to a point on section line between sections 23 and 35 of said township, 284 feet east of said section corner, that part of old road between intersecting point to be abandoned.
Change in Choteau and Bellevue road beginning at a point on said road at the center of section 19, township 24 north, range 7 west, thence northwesterly about three-fourths mile to intersection with same road; that part of present road between intersecting points to be abandoned.
Adjourned to 10 A. M., June 24.

SECOND DAY.
June 24 1902. Board met at 10 A. M., same members were present.
Prince and Dean presented contract for building extension of Dupuyer bridge. Same was signed.
Board then contracted with Prince and Dean to build two bridges in the Dry Forks, on Choteau and Dupuyer road, for the sum of three hundred dollars.
Ordered that Chairman Perkins superintend construction of the bridges contracted for.
Report of viewers of change in Choteau and Collins road in the vicinity of Moore's ranches, was approved, and damages awarded as follows: Chas. E. Moore, fifty dollars. Thos. J. Moore, twenty five dollars.
Ordered that county clerk have published in official paper of the county, the report of the State Examiner's examination of county offices made June 13, 1902.
Board then adjourned the special session sine die.

The work in various offices was in good shape, had been well done and was up to date. The treasurer by his watchfulness is collecting a \$150 protested check which has been held by the county since Sept. 1898. He is making an excellent record in license collections, although under considerable difficulty. It is doubtful if as much revenue is received from license collections at Cut Bank as there should. Owing to its distance from the county seat the treasurer is handicapped, and I suggest that the commissioners deputize a good man at Cut Bank to give special attention to collections there, particularly saloon licenses.
The collection of over \$4,000 delinquent taxes since December 1st is creditable to Mr. Gordon and profitable to the county.
I take pleasure in acknowledging numerous courtesies extended during my examination.
