#### Rules For Postmasters.

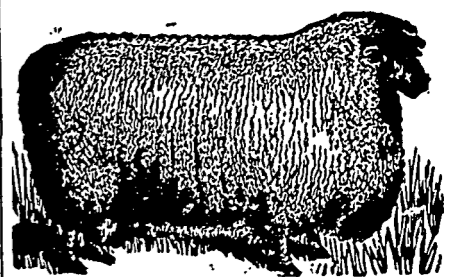
