Republican State Convention.

At a meeting of the republican state central committee held in Helena Wednesday evening it was decided to hold the state convention in the city of Great Falls on Saturday, September 27, 1902. It was decided to take the vote cast for Congressman S. G. Murray at the last election as the basis of the apportionment, and to allow one delegate for each fifty five votes. This will give the convention a total membership of 434, divided as follows:

Beaverhead, 14; Broadwater, 5; Carbon, 15; Cascade, 35; Choteau, 19; Custer, 10; Dawson, 9; Deer Lodge, 18; Fergus, 22; Flathead, 19; Gallatin, 21; Granite, 7; Jefferson, 9; Lewis and Clark, 36; Madison, 19; Meagher, 7; Missoula, 25; Park, 15; Powell, 10; Ravalli, 13; Rosebud, 7; Silver Bow, 60; Sweet Grass, 8; Teton, 10; Valley, 6; Yellowstone, 13.

DISTRICT COURT.

District court convened in Choteau last Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, Hon. D. F. Smith, judge of the Eleventh Judicial district, presiding. The first case tried was that of the State of Montana against James Black, charged with grand larceny, he having stolen a horse from S. L. Potter and sold it. County Attorney Sulgrove prosecuted and Judge Bair defended the prisoner. The case was turned over to the jury on Tuesday evening, the jurors being Joseph Hilger, Wm. Hodgskiss, I. H. Cox, Wm. Cook, Byron Corson, J. E. Cashman, Emory Knowlton, F. E. Moore, Percy Kilally, Geo. Burt, John Clack and F. A. West. They were unable to agree upon a verdict and this (Friday) morning they were discharged by the judge. It is understood the jury since Tuesday night has stood nine for acquittal and three for conviction.

Wednesday morning the case against Robert C. Palmer, charged with illegally killing elk, came up for trial. The state failed to make out a case strong enough to secure a conviction at the hands of the jury and the defendant was discharged.

On motion of the county attorney the case against Wm. Hoxie, on the same charge was dismissed.

In both of these cases it seems to be the opinion of many who heard the evidence that the defendants should never have been prosecuted on these charges.

In the case of the State of Montana against W. F. Kerr, charged with obstructing justice, the jury brought in a verdict of guilty and fixed his punishment at six months in the county jail, and a fine of \$100.

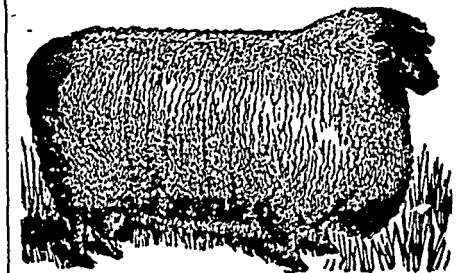

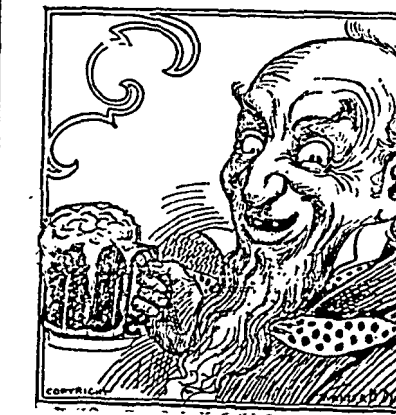
