Favor Annexation.

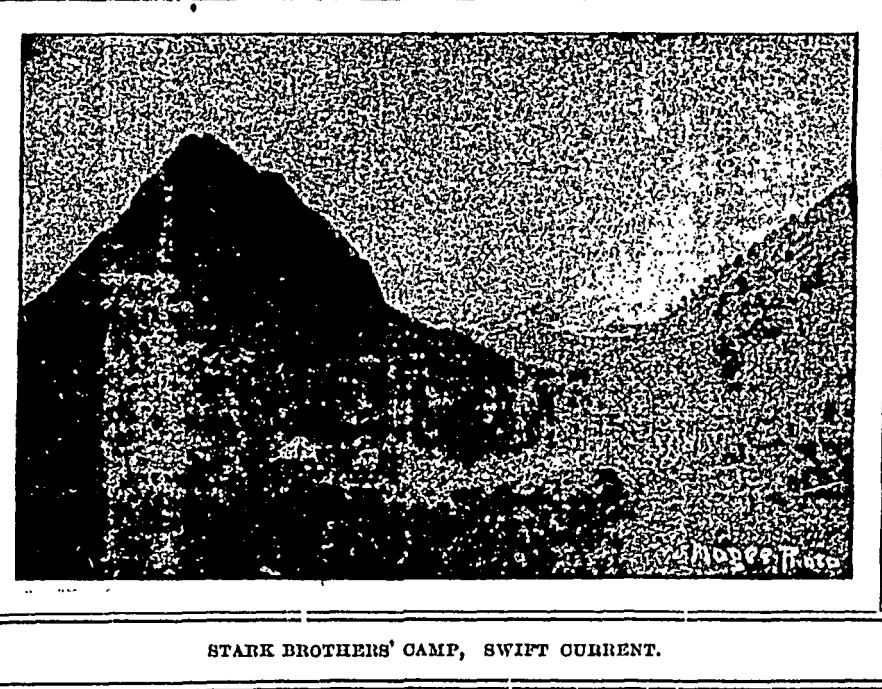
Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 9.—At the
meeting of sugar planters held here,
while resolutions were adopted favor-
ing federation with Canada, quite
a large section of those present were
anxious for annexation, to the United
States. The alarming condition of
the island's industries, especially
sugar planting, has made the people
desperate and nothing but the knowl-
edge of the American tariff prevents
unanimous support of the annexation
idea.

As To Prospecting For Oil.

F. N. Haiges, supervisor of the
Flathead forest reserve, has been in
communication with Washington
concerning the status of oil claims
and claimants on government land,
and has received the following in-
structions from the acting commis-
sioners, which will cause restless
nights to many of the putative oil
barons:

"For your information and guid-
ance in regard to the rights of the
miners in the Kintla lake region, and
others prospecting for oil, you are
instructed as follows:

"First—The right to prospect is
accorded to citizens of the United

States and those who have declared
their intention to become such.

"Second—A prospector has no oil
claim to any land until oil has actually
been discovered thereon. The mere
seepage of a little seum of oil on
water coming out of the ground in
the vicinity or on the land does not
constitute such a discovery.

"Third—Actual prospecting for oil
or developing of an oil mine cannot be
done by building houses, camps or
trails and roads, and the extensive
cutting of timber for such alleged
prospecting and developing must not
be tolerated.

"Legitimate prospecting for oil
consists in actual boring with proper
equipment, and while such legitimate
prospecting is being done the pros-
pector should be accorded the privi-
lege of cutting the necessary timber
therefor under your supervision.

"You will be guided by the above
information in dealing with the cases.
You will avoid giving offence un-
necessarily or hinder men from prop-
er or legitimate prospecting of any kind.
On the other hand, you will prevent
every unnecessary destruction of
timber by any one, and especially the
endless construction of wood roads
and trails intended to answer for as-
sessment work. This cutting, of
which a great deal has been reported
to occur, is a useless destruction,
serving no purpose, since it adds noth-
ing to the rights of the prospector.

"In promulgating these decisions
you will take pains to avoid any un-
necessary friction and cheerfully in-
form those interested in the matter of
the attitude of the department."

How to Make a Barometer.

For this you need a clean, clear
glass bottle. Take one drachm each
of camphor gum, saltpetre and am-
monia salts, and dissolve them in 13
drachms of pure alcohol. Shake till
dissolved. Then pour in bottle and
cork tightly.

Hang the bottle of mixture against
a wall, facing north, and it will prove
a perfect weather prophet.

When the liquid is clear it prom-
ises fair weather. When it is muddy
or cloudy it is a sign of rain.

When little white flakes settle in
the bottom it means that the weather
is growing colder, and the thicker the
deposit the colder it becomes.

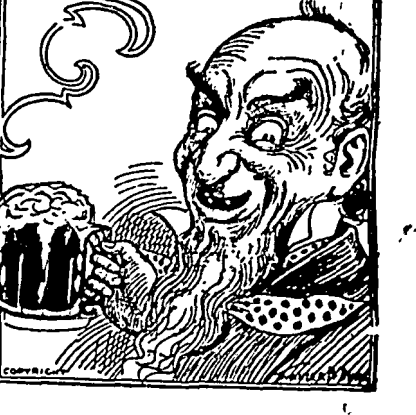
