### REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION

At a meeting of the Republican state central committee, held in the city of Helena, on the 3rd day of September, 1902, it was ordered that a Republican state convention be called to meet in the city of Great Falls, Mont., at 10 o'clock a. m., on Saturday, September 27th, 1902, for the purpose of placing in nomination one representative in the congress of the United States, one associate justice of the supreme court of the state of Montana, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before a Republican convention.

All electors of the state without regard to past political affiliations who believe in the principles of the Republican party and endorse its policies are cordially invited under this call to participate in the party primaries and the convention.

The representation for the convention has been apportioned among the several counties as follows, the basis being one delegate for every fifty-five votes or major fraction thereof cast for the Republican nominee for congress in the election of 1900:

The following rules have been adopted by the party for the government of the convention:

First—Delegates and alternate delegates shall be elected to the convention and in the event of the failure of a delegate to attend the alternate delegate shall cast the vote of the delegate whom he represents.

Second—In the absence of the delegate and his alternate a majority of the delegation from that county shall cast the vote of the absentee.

Third—In the absence of all delegates and alternate delegates from any county no vote shall be cast from said county.

Fourth—In the county in which the state convention is held no vote shall be cast for an absent delegate and alternate delegate.

Fifth—Delegates and alternate delegates must be Republicans and residents of the county which they represent.

### An Important Arrest Made.

An important arrest was made by Sheriff Taylor and Deputy Burbank on Monday of this week when Junius Young alias James Gould was lodged safely behind the prison bars.

Early in August of this year Young was arrested at Stirling, Alberta, on a charge of horse stealing, and while in charge of Sergt. Gordon of the Northwest Mounted Police, escaped somewhere between Stirling and Magrath. He headed for Montana and soon arrived at Choteau where he secured employment. On Sunday a traveler arrived here from Stirling and while talking to Deputy Burbank on the street Young passed. Being informed by the traveler that Young was wanted on the other side for horse-stealing, the deputy hunted up Sheriff Taylor and together they placed him under arrest. At the jail Young admitted that he was the man the N. W. M. P. were looking for, and on Monday morning he was taken to Coult's by Deputy Burbank where he will be turned over to the Canadian authorities who have been notified the arrest has been made and that the prisoner was willing to return without extradition papers.

### Death of a Pioneer.

David Auchard, one of the largest land owners and stock owners in Lewis and Clark county, who came to the state when it was a wilderness, died of inflammation of the bladder at 7:30 Monday evening at St. John's

hospital. He had been brought to the hospital ten days ago from his ranch, thirty five miles north of Wolf creek, and was at first thought to be improving, but Tuesday morning there was a change for the worse, which terminated in his death.

Mr. Auchard was a prominent stockgrower of Lewis and Clark county, owning in the neighborhood of 30,000 acres of land along the Dearborn river in the regions extending from the north fork to the Missouri. A side from raising cattle Mr. Auchard was an extensive breeder of fancy horses.

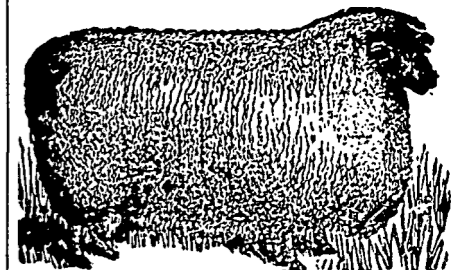
