What Protection Has Done.

What has protection done for  
America? An observant Englishman  
has told a party of the story in his  
complaint that America has invaded  
Europe. He complains that the  
Englishmen who a few years ago sup-  
plied the world, today sit down to his  
breakfast made of cereals manufactur-  
ed in Michigan, beefsteak from Chi-  
cago, a slice of bacon from New York,  
and bread made from Minneapolis  
flour. On the way to his office he  
rides in a car built in New York, pro-  
pelled by electrical machinery made  
in Schenectady, over a railroad con-  
structed by American engineers,  
largely of American materials and  
projected by American capitalists.

When he enters his office, if he is up  
to date, he sits in a revolving chair  
made in Chicago, before a roll top  
desk made in Buffalo; his letters are  
written on a type writer made in Illi-  
nois, he signs them with an Ameri-  
can fountain pen, dries the ink with  
a New England blotter and files his  
letter copies in files manufactured at  
Grand Rapids. If he goes to the  
races for pleasure he sees the highest  
stake won by an American horse, rid-  
den by an American jockey, and  
when he reads his evening paper he  
finds that the European nations are  
having battle-ships built in American  
ship yards, learns that an American  
artist is to paint the coronation of

King Edward and that 40,000 gold,  
silver and bronze medals ordered by  
the King to commemorate that cor-  
onation were made in Massachusetts;  
that the Emperor of Germany had  
his royal yacht built in New York and  
sent Prince Henry across the Atlantic  
to attend the launching when the  
daughter of the American president  
should christen it. These are some  
of the changes that the Englishmen  
complained of and they are largely  
due to the policy of protection due to  
American labor which is developed  
the American industry and enterprise  
until it evaded the old world and  
made the Britons fear that some  
American would come along and  
annex the British Isles as a museum  
of antiquity when free trade ruled the  
world. The democrats would how-  
ever, stop the wheel of progress and  
again change the current of business  
from England to the United States  
instead of allowing it to continue  
from the U. S. to England, Conti-  
nental Europe and all the world.

illiterate Voters.  
There are 21,300,000 inhabitants of  
the United States of voting age and  
2,300,000 of them, or about 11 per cent,  
were returned on the last census as  
illiterate—a very large proportion for  
a country in which the opportunities  
of education are universal.  
An examination of the figures  
shows that contrary to the general be-  
lief, it is not the foreign-born voters  
who cause the percentage to be  
so high. The proportion of illiterates  
among the foreign born voters in the  
United States is 11 5 per cent, where-  
as among the 10 5 per cent—not a very  
important difference.  
The part of the United States in  
which there is least illiteracy is the  
group of states which make up the  
middle west and northwest. Iowa  
and Nebraska have less than 3 per  
cent, Kansas less than 4 and Ohio,  
Illinois and Minnesota less than 5 per  
cent of illiterate inhabitants over the  
age of 21.  
In Utah and Washington, in the  
Pacific group of states, the percent-  
age of illiteracy is less than 4 per cent;  
in Colorado, Oregon and Wyoming  
less than 5.  
In New England and among the  
native-born inhabitants the percent-  
age is still lower, 1 per cent in Massa-  
chusetts, 1.5 in Connecticut, 2 per cent  
in New Hampshire and 2.5 in Rhode  
Island.  
In the south the rate of illiteracy  
among native born white inhabitants  
is highest in Louisiana, being 20 per  
cent. In North Carolina it is 19 per  
cent, Kentucky 15, Tennessee and  
Alabama 14, South Carolina, Virginia  
and Georgia 12, West Virginia 11, and  
Arkansas 10.  
The high rate of illiteracy in the  
United States is due largely to the  
colored inhabitants. There are 2,300,-  
000 of them over 21 years of age and  
of these 1,075,000 are illiterate—46  
per cent.  
Wherever colored inhabitants are  
numerous the rate of illiteracy is high;  
where they are few in number it is  
low; and leaving out the colored in-  
habitants the rate of illiteracy in the  
United States is not high and is  
being reduced steadily.

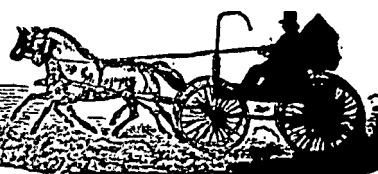
