Thanksgiving Proclamation.

Washington, Oct. 29.—President Roosevelt today issued his proclamation designating Thursday, Nov. 27, as a day of thanksgiving. The proclamation is as follows:

"According to the yearly custom of our people, it falls upon the president at this season of the year to appoint a day of festival and thanksgiving to God. Over a century and a quarter has passed since this country took its place among the nations of the earth, and during that time we have had on the whole more to be thankful for than has fallen to the lot of any other people. Generation after generation has grown to manhood and passed away. Each has had to bear its peculiar burdens, each to face its special crisis and each has known years of grim trial, when the country was menaced by malice, domestic or foreign, when the hand of the Lord was heavily upon it in drouth or flood or pestilence, when in bodily distress and anguish of soul it paid the penalty of folly and a froward heart. Nevertheless, decade by decade, we have struggled onward and upward. We now abundantly enjoy material wellbeing, and under the favor of the Most High we are striving earnestly to achieve moral and spiritual uplifting. This year that has just closed has been one of peace and of overflowing plenty. Rarely has any people enjoyed greater prosperity than we are now enjoying. For this we render heartfelt and solemn thanks to the giver of good and we seek to praise him not by words only, but by deeds, by the way in which we do our duty to ourselves and to our fellowmen.

"Now, therefore, I, Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, do hereby designate as a day of general thanksgiving, Thursday, the 27th of the coming November, and do recommend that throughout the land the people cease from their ordinary occupations and in their several homes and places of worship render thanks unto Almighty God for the manifold blessings of the past year.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the city of Washington, the 29th day of October, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and two, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty seventh.

Wants A Divorce.
On account of intemperance, failure to provide and gross cruelty on the part of her husband, Susan A. Parry has commenced an action for divorce from Thomas A. Parry.

In her complaint Mrs. Parry sets forth that on April 8, 1891, she was united in matrimony to the man who is now her husband, and that as the issue of the marriage there is now one child, Sadie, who is now ten years of age.

The complaint alleges that for the past year her husband has been a confirmed and habitual drunkard, working only part of the time, and spending a large part of his earnings for liquor, and that for his inordinate love for intoxicants, has not, for more than 12 months, contributed to the support of the plaintiff and her child, and that during that time he has not furnished her with more than a very small portion of the things absolutely necessary to her existence.

Mrs. Parry avers that for five years her husband has been guilty of extreme cruelty toward her, and that on several occasions he has beaten, bruised and choked her, and called her all kinds of vile names; that he has wrongfully accused her of all kinds of crimes, and has caused her great physical and mental anguish.

Citing certain occasions of cruelty,

Mrs. Parry alleges that during the month of February, 1902, when the thermometer was hovering about the point of zero, he drove her and her child out of the house and refused to allow them to return for a long time. In July, 1901, while residing at Pondera, she alleges that he beat her and bruised her hands causing great pain. On Labor day, of the present year, she complains that her husband came home in a beastly state of intoxication, and in the middle of the night beat and bruised her, and caused such commotion by yelling that he terrified her by loud and abusive language, calling her vile names and applying such epithets to her that the whole neighborhood was aroused.

Mrs. Parry further alleges that her husband is brutal in his instincts, and an unfit person, by reason thereof and his intemperance, to have the care and custody of their daughter.

The complaint calls the attention of the court to the fact that the defendant earns \$3 per day when he works, and that he is able to earn that amount every day, were it not for his intemperate habits. The plaintiff asks for \$50 per month alimony, \$100 for attorney fees, and the custody of her daughter.—Tribune.

Available for Irrigation Works.

E. A. Nixon, who has been in charge of one of the parties of the United States geological survey that has been working in Choteau county, along the line of the proposed St. Mary's canal, is in the city. He states that the survey work is in season is practically completed. The field notes and reports of the several crops will be sent to Washington and during the winter they will be compiled and it will be determined by the department whether or not the proposed construction of the canal is feasible.

Mr. Nixon says he is satisfied that the decision will be favorable to construction. While the route may vary slightly from the originally surveyed, yet it has been found that the canal may be built at less than the originally estimated expense, and the surveys have shown the practicability of construction of a splendid storage system.

Mr. Nixon is in receipt of a report from the commissioners of the general land office, showing that, for the last fiscal year, the receipts from the disposition of public lands in the states in which irrigation works are to be constructed had increased so greatly that the fund for irrigation purposes amounted, at the end of the fiscal year, to \$9,500,000. The commissioner estimates that the funds will amount to \$15,000,000 by next July, and that it will be nearly \$20,000,000 before the construction of any canals is ordered.—Tribune.
