MONTANA IS REDEEMED!

Dixon, for Congress, Carries the State by Over
4,000; Holloway's Majority Over 8,000.

LEGISLATURE REPUBLICAN.

Helena, Nov. 5.—The democratic
state committee concede the state to
the republicans. The republican
committee claim that Holloway's
majority will be over 8,000, and that
Dixon's will be about 4,000. The
legislature is probably republican.

Holloway carries Lewis and Clarke
county by about 700 and Dixon will
have about 500 in the county.

Helena, Nov. 4.—It is estimated
that Dixon, republican, for congress,
will carry the state by 4,000; Holo-
way, associate justice, republican, by
8,000. Legislature slightly republi-
can.

Butte, Nov. 4.—Reports received
up to midnight gave the state to the
republicans almost beyond a doubt,
although defeat has not yet been
conceded by the democrats. Over 25
precincts have been heard from, in-
cluding the largest in Montana. For
associate justice of the supreme
court, W. L. Holloway, republican,
has 9,587; Jere Leslie, democrat,
7,847.

Helena, Nov. 5.—It was late to-
night before reliable returns had
been received from all counties on
legislative results. The republican
majority in the house is very gratify-
ing—they having a majority of five
over both the democrats and the
laborites. Out of a membership of
71 the democrats have only 14 in the
house—four less than the laborites.
The following shows the political
complexion:

Of the new senators the republi-
cans have won in Cascade, Choteau,
Fergus, Flathead, Madison, Missoula,
Powell and Yellowstone. The democ-
rats have won in Broadwater,
Granite, Jefferson and Ravalli.
There is still some doubt about the
results in Rosebud, Ravalli and
Teton. Silver Bow has probably
been carried by the fusionists.

Lewis & Clarke is Republican.

Helena, Nov. 4.—Lewis & Clarke
county gives an overwhelming ma-
jority to republican state candidates,
but with many outlying precincts to
hear from the result on the county
ticket is uncertain, with indications
favoring the election of most if not
all of the republican nominees.

Holloway's majority over Leslie is
the sensation of the vote, as so far
revealed, the result being more than
two to one in favor of the republican
candidate for associate judge.

New York is Republican.

New York, Nov. 4.—In spite of a
phenomenally large vote in New
York and in Kings county for Bid
S. Coler, democrat, the returns up to
a late hour tonight indicated the re-
election of Benj. E. Odell, republi-



can, to the governorship of New
York state, from 16,000 to 20,000.
Color's plurality in Greater New
York exceeded 103,000, a surplus of
3,000 above the claim made by Chas.
F. Murphy, leader of Tammany hall.
But even that vote was not sufficient
to overcome the republican majority
from up the state. The O'Fall vote
in the country districts was lighter
than two years ago, but Color's was
also lower than Stanchfield's in the
same year.
Figures from the congressional
districts in New York City and the
Long Island counties apparently
show a loss of four members of con-
gress to the republicans, the heavy
Color vote having carried them. The
democrats made gains in the state
legislature, but the gains were not
sufficient to endanger the republican
hold on the seat in the United States
senate now held by Thomas C. Platt.

The Next Congress.

Washington, Nov.—Although the
returns from doubtful congressional
districts are slow in arriving, the indi-
cations at midnight were that the re-
publicans could control the next house
of representatives by a narrow margin.

In the present house, with a mem-
bership of 257, the republicans have
41 majority. Under the apportion-
ment the Fifty eighth house will con-
sist of 386 members a majority of
which is 194. The 13 democratic
states, not counting West Virginia,
but including Missouri, have 125 rep-
resentatives. The democrats have
carried 116 of these districts and the
republicans probably five—two in
Tennessee, one in Kentucky and two
in Missouri—with two in North Caro-
lina, one in Virginia and one in Ala-
bama doubtful, according to the latest
returns. To obtain a majority in the
next house it was necessary, therefore,
for the democrats to secure 78 votes
in the north and west. In this terri-
tory have at present 52 representatives.

The latest returns indicate that this
strength has been held with the ex-
ception of one seat each from Idaho,
Montana and Nevada, to which re-
turns at this hour are inconclusive.
Adding 49 to 116 gives the democrats
165. The democrats show they have
made a gain of three in Pennsylvania,
one in Nebraska, one in Delaware, one
in Wisconsin, two in Maryland, one
in Colorado and probably four in New
York, swelling the total to 178. This
leaves them 16 short of a majority,
with the result in five doubtful ra-
publican districts to be heard from
and doubtful districts in the north
and west from which returns are as
yet inadequate, as follows: West

Virginia 2, Ohio 1, Indiana 2, Illinois
2, Iowa 1, Nebraska 1, Kansas 1, Min-
nesota 2, Michigan 1, California 1,
Utah 1,—a total of 21.

The returns at 1 o'clock add one
democrat in New Jersey, one in Min-
nesota, one in Illinois, one in Alabama
and one in North Carolina to the
democratic representation, a total of
six; but two of the gains credited
to democrats in Pennsylvania should
properly be set down as fusion, the
republicans making democrats ac-
tually elected, by returns thus far re-
ceived, 184, with doubtful districts in
Minnesota having gone democratic,
one in Kansas, republican, Kansas
having gone republican, and one in
Iowa, republican. Three of the other
doubtful southern districts went dem-
ocratic.

Washington, Nov. 5.—At 2:30 a. m.
returns received here indicate that
the republicans have elected 196 rep-
resentatives to the house, democrats
176 and independents 3 (in Pennsyl-
vania), leaving 11 districts in doubt.

Washington, Nov. 5.—The latest re-
turns to 10:30 o'clock tonight show
that the republicans (including in this
description the fusionists elected in
the Pittsburg-Allegheny districts in
Pennsylvania) will control the next
house by a vote of 201 republicans to
179 democrats, with one district, the
Eight Tennessee and two California
districts yet remaining so much in
doubt that official returns will be
needed to decide the result. The
totals given are believed to be correct,
although there are a few districts,
such as two in Colorado and one in
Minnesota, where the republicans and
democrats respectively, do not con-
cede defeat, but the general result
could not be effected even should
their claims prove well founded.

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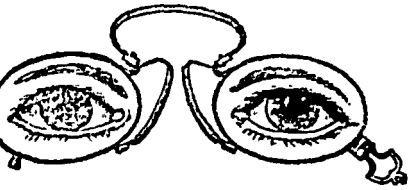
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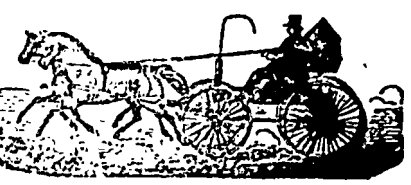
