Owens An Empire.

John M. Hot, of Miles City, has bought 67,000 acres of land from the Northern Pacific, which makes him the largest land owner in Custer county and gives him absolute control of over 200 square miles of the finest range in eastern Montana.

The land in question lies about 50 miles southeast of Miles City, most of it between Mizpah and the Powder river. Mr. Holt will have frontage on the Powder river of over nine miles and irrigates several hundred acres of splendid alfalfa land.

**IN TETON COUNTY.**

The result of the election held last Tuesday is practically settled, although the returns from some of the precincts are as yet incomplete. The precinct of St. Mary gave Connelly a majority of six; Webb 3; Wallace Taylor 20; Aspling 16; Gordon 10; Armstrong 9; Erickson 9; Miss Acton 14. On the face of the returns the republican candidate for congressman has carried the county by about 150 majority. Connelly, for state senator, is defeated by 14 votes, while John E. Webb, republican candidate for representative, has won out by 125 votes.

The vote on county commissioners, with the precincts of Cut Bank and St. Marys to hear from, is as follows: W. M. Cowgill ..... 486

John S. Gordon, republican, defeats his democratic opponent by 357 votes.

C. W. Taylor, democratic candidate for sheriff, is a victor over Geo. C. Taylor, the present incumbent, by 87 votes.

Your Uncle Al Warner for the third time has been elected county clerk, defeating Perry Aspling, his democratic opponent, by 75 votes. Two years ago the race between these men for the same office was very close—Warner winning by seven.

The race between Thos. O. Larson, republican, and James Armstrong, democrat, for assessor, was not close enough to be exciting—Larson is a winner by about 250.

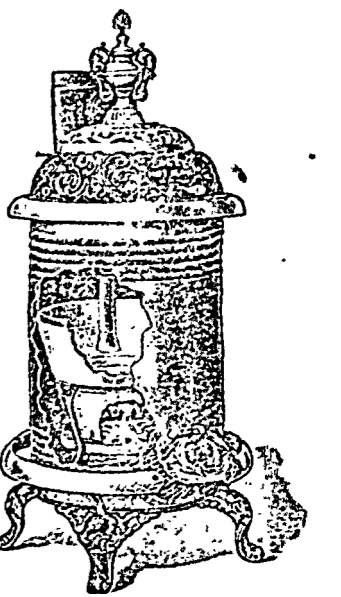
J. E. Erickson, democrat, defeats James Sulgrove, republican, for county attorney, by 220.

On the face of the returns—all precincts heard from—Miss Acton, republican, is only one vote ahead of Mrs. Brown, her democratic opponent for superintendent of schools. It will probably take the official canvass to determine who is elected.

The returns on surveyor, public administrator and coroner are very incomplete, but it is probable that the republican nominees are successful.
