The recent election cost the various counties of the state considerably more than \$100,000. Elections come high but we must have them—otherwise some of our political bosses could never be indicted.

The county commissioners met in special session last Saturday, Commissioners Perkins and Foster being present. The proposed road from the Barton bench to the Choteau Dupuyer road, through Foster's land, was put through without a hitch, notwithstanding the protests of over one hundred taxpayers living in this vicinity. The present board go out of office January 1st next, and after the new board takes charge it is very probable the people of Choteau and the bench will be able to get roads where they want them. In the meantime possibly a couple of thousand dollars of the county's money will be spent on a road that will benefit no one but Commissioner Foster.

### District Court.

Hon. D. F. Smith, judge, and Court Stenographer X. K. Stout arrived here yesterday morning from Kalispell and court opened promptly at 10 o'clock.

The first case to be tried was the one of the State of Montana against James Buck, on a charge of grand larceny. Buck is accused of having stolen a horse from S. L. Potter, the Rocky Springs sheepman, and selling it to a shepherd employed by Jos. C. McCuag, near Dupuyer. Potter's ownership of the horse was not disputed, the sale of the horse was proven, and admitted by the prisoner, who claimed, however, that he had Mr. Potter's permission to dispose of the animal. This is the second time this case has been tried in this court, the previous trial—in September—resulting in a disagreement of the jury. The jurors in the present trial are M. A. Wilcox, Jacob Wagner, Nels Johnson, Frank Salmon, R. S. Brown, Martin Larson, Peter Hughes, F. A. Sullivan, Dan Sullivan, A. M. Kennedy, E. D. Pierce and Bernard Arneson. They have been out since about five o'clock last evening unable to agree upon a verdict.
