Proceedings of the Board of County
Commissioners of Teton County,
Montana. Regular December
Term, 1902.

Choteau, Mont., December 1, 1902.
Board met in regular December session
at the office of the county clerk, at 10
a. m. Present, Chairman C. B. Perkins,
Commissioners M. Connelly and W. M.
Foster and the clerk.
Minutes of regular September meet-
ing and of special meetings of September
8, October 6 and November 15, 1902,
were read and approved.
Adjourned to 2 p. m.

APTERNOON SESSION.
Board reassembled at 2 p. m., all mem-
bers present.

Board proceeded to examine the re-
ports of county and township officers for
the quarter ending November 30, 1902.
The following were approved and or-
dered filed:

A. C. Warner, county clerk. Report of
warrants issued in payment of salaries of
county officers, amounting to \$2,456.33
on contingent fund and \$1,467.50 on the
general fund.

A. C. Warner, county clerk. Report of
official fees collected, amounting to
\$510.25, with treasurer's receipt for same.
Sterling McDonald, clerk district
court. Report of official fees collected,
amounting to \$141.80, and turned over to
treasurer.

Geo. C. Taylor, sheriff. Report of
official fees collected, on account of civil
business, amounting to \$7.20, with
treasurer's receipt for same.
Geo. C. Taylor, sheriff. Report of jail
boarders. Warrant ordered for expenses
incurred.

Thos. O. Larson, assessor. Report of
tax collections, amounting to \$171.03, for
personal property taxes; \$235.80 special
poor taxes and \$85.00 for special road
taxes, with treasurer's receipts for same.
Walter Mathews, surveyor. Report of
road and office work.

James Sulgrove, county attorney. Re-
port of office work, registry agents visited
and California Reports ordered.

Annie N. Anstad, poor house con-
tractor. Report showing four inmates
cared for and one pauper buried.

J. E. DeHans, justice of the peace,
Choteau township. Report showing \$5.00
fines collected, with treasurer's receipt for
same. Warrants ordered in payment of
costs incurred.

Adjourned to 10 a. m., Dec. 2.
SECOND DAY.

December 2, 1902. Board met at 10
a. m., all members present and proceeded
to open proposals for the county work
for the year, 1903, as follows:
Annie Anstad, care of county poor-
\$6.75 per capita per week. Burial of
paupers, \$34.00 per capita.
Angus Bruce, care of county poor-
\$6.22 per capita per week. Burial of
paupers, \$31.95 per capita.
T. Brooks, medical attendance, \$850.00
F. A. Long, medical attendance, \$1,000.00.
C. H. Drake, medicines, \$250.00.

On motion of Commissioner Connelly
all the proposals for medical attendance
and medicines were rejected, and on
motion of Commissioner Foster it was
ordered that contract be made with Dr.
T. Brooks at \$650.00 for medical attend-
ance on county poor and inmates of jail,
and at \$200.00 for medicines and surgical
dressings. Action on proposals for care
and burial of paupers was deferred.

Board then resumed consideration of
reports of county and township officers.
The following were approved and or-
dered filed:

Sterling McDonald, clerk district
court. Report of warrants issued in pay-
ment of district court witnesses and
jurors, amounting to \$883.50 for witness-
es and \$1,555.70 for jurors.

Geo. W. Magee, justice of the peace,
Dupuyer township. Report showing
\$20.00 fines collected, with treasurer's
receipt for same. Warrants ordered for
costs incurred.

Wm. Dawes, justice of the peace,
Marius township. Report showing
\$132.50 fines collected and turned over to
treasurer. Warrants ordered for costs
incurred.

Wm. Dawes, acting coroner. Report
of inquests held. Warrants ordered for
costs incurred.

Board then proceeded to audit claims
against county. Warrants were ordered
for those allowed.
Claim of W. B. Wine, M. D., for hold-
ing autopsy on body of Chas. Williams,
was disallowed as not properly chargeable
to Teton county, there being a contract
with a physician for such work.
Adjourned to 2 p. m.

APTERNOON SESSION.
Board reassembled at 2 p. m., all mem-
bers present, and resumed business
of auditing claims against county. War-
rants were ordered in payment of those
allowed.

Adjourned to 10 a. m., Dec. 3.
THIRD DAY.

Dec. 3, 1902. Board met at 10 a. m.
all members present, and resumed busi-
ness of auditing claims against county.
Warrants were ordered in payment of
those allowed.

Adjourned to 2 p. m.
APTERNOON SESSION.
Board reassembled at 2 p. m., all mem-
bers present, and continued business of
auditing claims against county. War-
rants were ordered in payment of those
allowed.

Adjourned to 10 a. m., Dec. 4.

FOURTH DAY.
December 4, 1902. Board met at 10
a. m., all members present, and resumed
business of auditing claims against
county. Warrants were ordered in pay-
ment of those allowed.

Choteau Band Concert.

APTERNOON SESSION.
Board reassembled at 2 p. m., all mem-
bers present, and resumed business of
auditing claims against county. War-
rants were ordered in payment of those
allowed.

Affidavit was presented of John Harris,
manager of Bouton & St. Louis Cattle
Co., requesting cancellation of erroneous
assessment of 500 head of cattle in 1900,
all of said company's cattle being listed
in Choteau county. After due considera-
tion it was ordered that treasurer cancel
said assessment on delinquent tax book.

Dr. T. Brooks presented contract for
medical attendance and medicines for
1903, accompanied by bond in sum of
\$1,500.00, with Wm. Hodgskies and
Julius Hirshberg as sureties. Contract
signed and bond approved.

Adjourned to 10 a. m., Dec. 5.
FIFTH DAY.

December 5, 1902. Board met at 10
a. m., all members present and continued
business of auditing claims against
county. Warrants were ordered in pay-
ment of those allowed.

Board then proceeded to consider re-
ports of road viewers, and took action as
follows:
On proposed change in Dupuyer and
Pondera road: Beginning at a point on
the Dupuyer and Marias Bridge road
south of a point from which a coulee
runs east to Spring creek, thence in an
easterly direction, and on south side of
said coulee to Spring creek at a
point near the southeast corner of section
4, township 28 north, range 4 west, thence
east to old road. Report approved and
\$200.00 awarded John Crichton for right-
of-way to be paid on delivery of deed.
Road was declared a public highway and
ordered opened, surveyed and platted.

Change on Ralston Gap and Blackfoot
road as follows: Beginning near north-
east corner of section 15, township 25
north, range 6 west, on present surveyed
road, thence northwesterly to a point on
the section line between sections 3 and
10 about 600 feet west of the quarter cor-
ner between said sections 3 and 10, thence
northerly about one-fourth mile, thence
northwesterly to intersect the county
road at the Alkali creek bridge on sec-
tion 32, township 26 north, range 6 west,
old road to be abandoned between initial
and terminal points of new road.

Change on Choteau and North Fork
at Sun river road as follows: Beginning at
a point marked by stone marked "R,"
which is at the end of the first course of
road from North Fork bridge as at
present laid out, thence northeasterly at
a distance of 9,322 feet to top of hill on
Sun river bench, thence northeasterly at
a slight angle 1950 feet to the section
corner between sections 10, 11, 14 and 15,
township 21 north, range 6 west, thence
north in conformity to section line three
miles to section corner between sections
25, 27, 24 and 35, township 22 north,
range 6 west, thence east in conformity
to section line for two miles to the corner
between sections 30 and 31, township 22
north, range 6 west, and sections 25 and
35, township 22 north, range 6 west,
thence one mile east in conformity to
to section line to section corner between
sections 29 and 31, township 22 north,
range 5 west, thence north in conformity
to section line to quarter corner, between
sections 29 and 30, thence northeasterly
about 2,000 feet to intersect surveyed
road, old road to be abandoned between
initial and terminal points of new road.
Report approved, and there being no
non-consenting land owners, no dam-
ages to be awarded, road was declared a

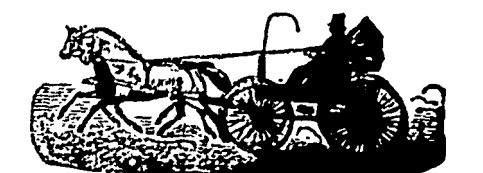
