Before The Primaries

Just May, June and July then comes the month that will witness the first state wide test of the primary law in Montana. Just May then comes the month in which the various candidating hats must be in the political ring for the primaries. It is time for political announcements, and for plans. Particularly it appeals to the Courier as the time for a militant republican party to plan an aggressive campaign to secure the right men on the state ticket for this fall.

There are four offices on the state ticket to be voted on in November - two congressmen, elected at large in this state; the associate justice of the supreme court, and one railroad commissioner. For the consideration of the voters who will be expected to make the choice of candidates for this fall, the Courier would suggest four good men: For congress Charles N. Pray, of Great Falls; and Harry L. Wilson, of Billings; for associate justice, Judge William L. Holloway of the present supreme court; and for railroad commissioner, Dan Boyle, of the present commission.

There are urgent reasons why the republican party in this state and in all the west should put forward good strong men for congress this fall. Montana, as a result of the 1912 election, has been misrepresented in congress for the past two years. Tom Stout and John M. Evans have loaned the strength of their voice and vote to the democracy of the east and south in putting in effect the anti-farmer tariff measure which discriminates against the farmer of every section and most especially the farmer of the west. They have supported the program which

cost the wool growers of Montana many thousands of dollars last year alone; which has dealt the sugar beet industry of the Yellowstone valley an expensive blow; the tariff program which has lowered the prices paid the Gallatin farmer for his seed peas to that point where there is no profit, according to the testimony of the farmer himself; they voted for the tariff which flooded Montana with New Zealand butter and sent local prices for butter fat tumbling just when the infant industry was finding its feet; the tariff which sends Chinese eggs into this country by the tons, cutting down the legitimate earnings of the American farm wife.

Stout and Evans did these things, and the Montana farmer has a great big wallop waiting for them in November. Montana had a friend at court when Charles N. Pray was in congress. Though he may not have been the brilliant success at the tango teas that Tom Stout has been, he was always the same steady, faithful old Charlie Pray, and the people knew where to find him when they wanted him.

In suggesting as his running mate Harry L. Wilson of Billings, the Courier has in mind the brilliant gubernatorial race of the young man who came within a scant two thousand votes of defeating Governor Sam V. Stewart, in spite of the fact that he ran on a divided ticket, when the bull moose move had reached its zenith. He was one of the original progressives of eastern Montana, long before the split over the Chicago convention had been dreamed of. He comes from a farming community and has felt the effect of the control of the county's economic policies by southern democracy.

Divers democratic district judges are being groomed by their friends to make the race for associate justice of the supreme court. They are doubtless upright judges and learned men. But in presenting the name of Associate Justice William L. Holloway to succeed himself, the republican party of this state will arouse a hearty response from the people of all sections of the state. Judge Holloway has been tried in his high office and found not wanting. His duty has been well done, and he merits the renomination and the reelection which he will seek at the primaries and the polls in November.

Vera Cruz is Peaceful

Vera Cruz, Mexico, May 5. -- With Brigadier General Funston established at Vera Cruz, in command of the 5,000 United States soldiers, and with 3,000 marines patrolling the city and American civil government under martial law set up, the United States forces here are busy improving the sanitary conditions. Friendly feeling of the inhabitants toward the American army is growing, the refugee trains are reported to be coming with increasing regularity, and a sufficient supply of food for a reasonable time is assured.

Dr. Gregorio Gutierrez has been appointed medical officer at the port under the civil government established by Admiral Badger. Dr. Gutierrez in addition to caring for the sanitation of the city, inspects all refugees starting for United States ports and is thus enabling immigration officials to cut down the period of detention imposed upon refugees arriving in the United States.

Robert J. Kerr, lawyer, of Chicago and Mexico City, is civil governor of Vera Cruz under martial law. Other civil officers are:

Inspector of ports and customs, Commander Stickney, U. S. N. Administrator of Justice, William F. Buckley, lawyer, of Austin, Texas, and Mexico City. Treasurer, Charles H. Steward, of Indianapolis, Ind., and Cordoba, Mexico.
