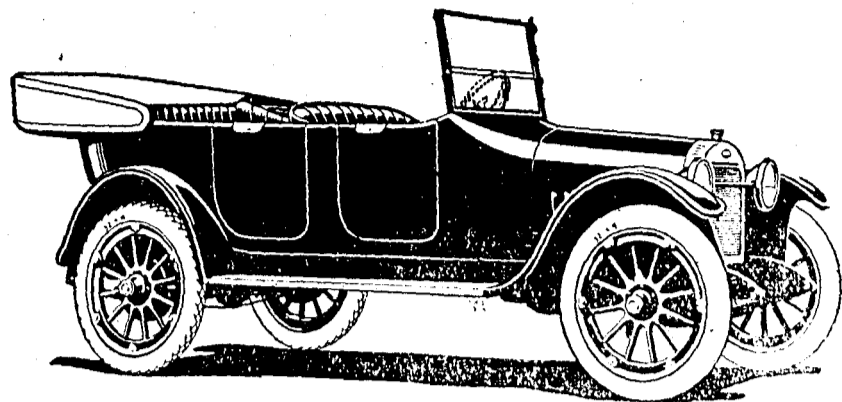
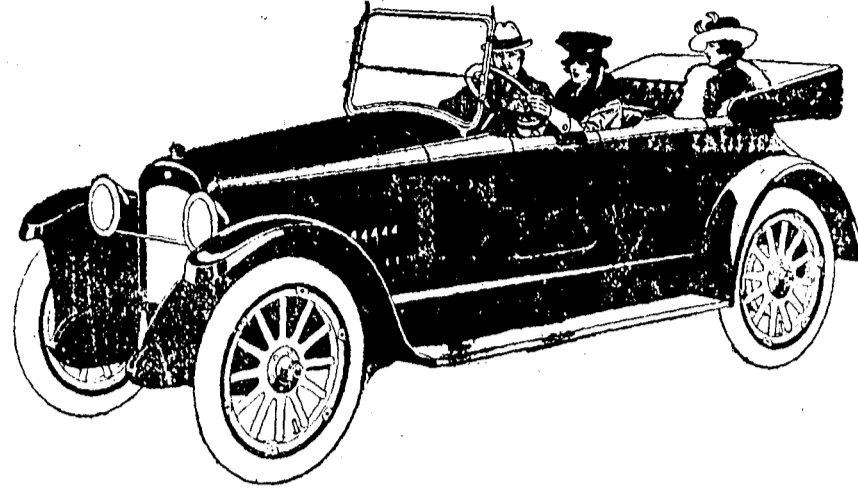

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CLASS ONE MEN UNTIL EXHAUSTED

District Quotas to Be Fixed by the Number of Eligible Men in Division.

Washington, April 24—Congress has just changed the army draft regulations so that men needed in agriculture or industry won't be drafted from one district while the workers in non-essentials are draft free in another.

It took nearly three months to pass the classification bill, but the job is finally done.

The bill changes apportionment of draft quotas drastically, as follows:

Quotas will be figured on a basis of the number of eligible men in class 1, not on a percentage of the total registration.

If Butte has fewer physically competent men in class 1 than has another city of the same size, fewer men will be called from Butte than from that other city. Or it will work the other way around.

Uncle Sam will base his call to Butte on the number of physically fit men in class 1, rather than on the total number of males within draft age.

Another important bill affecting the draft is still tied up in the house. This is the bill to make men who have become 21 since last June liable to draft.

This bill, the war department figures, would let into the draft more than 700,000 new class one men. It would set far in the future the day when men with dependents will have to be called to the colors.

Both house and senate have taken their time in respect to these bills. Both were strongly urged in General Crowder's report the first week in December, when congress reconvened for the present session.

The "classification bill" was introduced in the senate January 15, and passed March 1.

A duplicate of the senate bill as passed was substituted for a house bill on the same subject that had been previously introduced, but it was April 13 before the senate bill was passed by the house. The total time taken to make the bill a law, was, therefore, nearly three months.

Recent draft calls have been sent out under the old law, because we had to have new men to keep our cantonments and training facilities at work. The war could not wait on congress.

There was strong opposition to the classification bill largely dictated by politics. Congressmen and senators from districts where there is a preponderance of class 1 men were afraid to touch a thing that affected their constituents so vitally.

Support of the new law has come in great measures from country districts, where there are fewer unmarried men of draft age, in proportion to population than in big cities.

Congressional action on the bill to make men who have reached 21 since registration day subject to draft has been even slower than

that on the classification bill.

Introducing in both houses and senate Jan. 15, it has not yet been reported out by the house military committee.

The senate passed it March 29, but house military committeemen say they have no idea when it will be reported out.

MEN COMING OF AGE TO BE CALLED TO COLORS

Washington, April 25—The house late today adopted the senate resolution for the registration for military of young men who have reached the age of 21 years since June 5 last. The measure now goes to conference. An amendment offered by Representative Hull of Iowa, and adopted, 119 to 81, provides that men registered under the bill shall be placed at the bottom of the classes to which they may be assigned.
