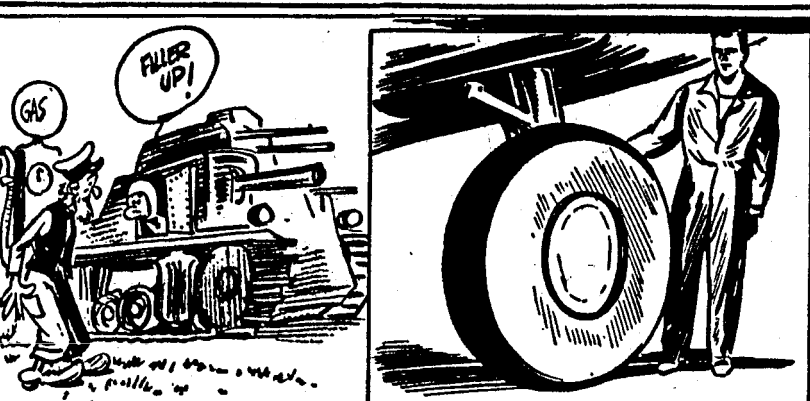

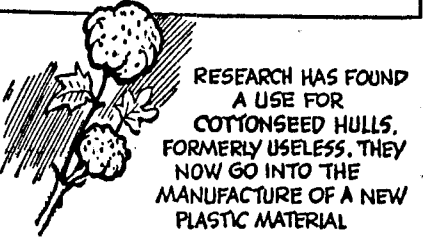


THE GAS TANK OF A MEDIUM ARMY TANK HOLDS 175 GALLONS...

THANKSGIVING IS THEME OF ROTARY TALK

Americans Have Many Reasons for Thanksgiving, Rotarian Asserts

In his summary of the week's events for Rotarians last Wednesday, Albert Erickson discussed the British revival of fighting in Libya, and the Russian situation which seemed unfavorable to the Soviet Union. He noted also the congress in Berlin attended by representatives of states favorable to the Axis.

Chairman E. E. Hazel announced that the next Rotary dinner would be at Mrs. Brown's boarding house Monday evening at 7 o'clock.

Harold Cantrell, high school guest-of-the-month, made an informative talk on the Future Farmers of America. He told his listeners that the organization fosters several out-of-doors projects which have great educational and recreational value. The goal of every member in this state is to become a "Montana Farmer" after which he may aspire to the degree of "American Farmer." The awards are made annually at the Kansas City Livestock show, he said.

A project of the local F.F.A. chapter has been the placing of curbing around the high school block and the development of a lawn on the parkways. Besides they are sponsoring a strong safety program this year, he said.

Rev. Calvin J. Logan, of the Presbyterian church, made an appropriate and appreciated address on the theme of being truly thankful, even in spite of adversity. The properly thankful person looks for something to be thankful for, he pointed out. Americans for many years seem to have been afraid to be grateful, lest they find later that adversity is still with us. "Are we suffering because times are hard, or because we are soft?" he asked. "It has been said that the well-to-do need the poor as much as the poor need charity. The prosperous man develops sympathy when he sees his fellow-man in need of his help."

"We are thankful for faith in America; if we are truly thankful, we shall expect to do our part thankfully," he said in closing.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE "Ancient and Modern Necromancy, Alias Mesmerism and Hypnotism, Denounced" was the subject of the lesson-sermon which was read in all Churches of Christ Scientist, on Sunday, Nov. 30.

The golden text was: "Thus saith the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel; Let not your prophets and your diviners, that be in the midst of you, deceive you... For they prophesy falsely unto you in my name: I have not sent them, saith the Lord." (Jeremiah 29:8, 9.)

Among the citations which comprised the lesson-sermon was the following from the Bible: "Let no man deceive you with vain words: For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light: Proving what is acceptable unto the Lord. And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them. See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil." (Ephesians 5: 6, 8, 10, 11, 15, 16.)

The lesson-sermon also included the following passage from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health With Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "If mortals would keep proper ward over mortal mind, the brood of evils which infest it would be cleared out. We must begin with this so-called mind and empty it of sin and sickness, or sin and sickness will never cease. Evil thoughts and aims reach no farther and do no more harm than one's belief permits. Evil thoughts, lusts, and malicious purposes cannot go forth, like wandering pollen, from one human mind to another, finding unsuspected lodgement, if virtue and truth build a strong defense." (pp 234 and 235.)

THANKSGIVING SERVICE
