Life In Pakistan Described at Meeting of AAUW

Clifford Doke, who spent six months in Pakistan living with four different families as a delegate of the International Farm Youth Exchange, described his experiences to the Dillon branch of A.A.U.W. the evening of January 23 at the home of Mrs. Sheldon E. Davis with Mrs. Lura Penwell co-hostess. His home is near Glasgow, Montana, and he is a student at Montana State College.

Illustrating his talk with slides, he explained the geography of Pakistan, the social customs, education, religion and economic conditions of the inhabitants, pointing out that the scale of living compared to American standards is low, yet the people are happy.

Sanitation is almost nonexistent, food lacks variety with rice the staple diet and the money income is very low. Methods of farming are backward and operators who might use some mechanized equipment hesitate to do so because it would take work away from those who need it. He pointed out many differences in culture but showed the reasons behind their customs, in his interesting talk.
