OPERATION PULL-EM-IN NOW UNDER WAY FOR CO. D, 163rd ARMORED

Not only an important unit in Montana's contribution to the nation's defense forces, Company D, 163rd Armored Cavalry Regiment is important to Dillon in other ways. It provides young men of the community the chance to obtain training at home, and at the same time advance in military grade and rank.

In economic importance, Company D means bringing into Dillon more than \$40,000 per year. With the increased strength to 90 men now being sought, the revenue to Dillon would amount to around \$100,000 per year according to Master Sergeant Michael Proulx.

D Company is planning a series of events in connection with its recruiting drive now under way. This is known as "Operation Pull-Em-In" and prospective recruits are invited to contact Sergeant Proulx at the Armory (phone 84-W) for full details.

At present D Company has a number of attractive openings to be filled and young men are urged to inform themselves on these possibilities.

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Use of Federal Income Tax Form 1040 Is Told

"All persons" with adjusted gross incomes of \$5,000 or more or who have wages not subject to withholding tax, interest and dividends of \$100 or more, are to use the Form 1040 when filing their 1955 income tax returns, Thomas M. Robinson, district director of Internal Revenue for the District of Montana, advised today.

If a taxpayer's income is less than \$5,000 from salary or wages and deductions are not itemized, he may elect to use Form 1040 but need to fill out only page 1, using the tax table on page 16 of the instructions.

If business or farming income is involved, taxpayers are to report on the separate schedules C or F. The total is carried forward to lines 8 or 9 on page 1 of the Form 1040.

"If the total income is \$5,000 or more per year, compute tax on page 2 of the Form 1040," stated the district director, adding, "All other types of income, such as income from dividends, interest, gains and losses from sale or exchange of property, pension or annuity incomes, rents or royalty income, or income from partnerships or estates or other sources are reported in the proper columns on page 3 of the Form 1040.

Care should be taken that income is reported properly on the pages and spaces provided for on the return. The totals are then carried forward to line 10, page 1, to become a part of the total adjusted gross income."

Short Form Usage

If the taxpayer's income is less than \$5,000 per year from salary, wages, business or farming, he may compute his tax from the tax table, using only page 1 of Form 1040; the business form (schedule C) or the farm form (schedule F).

It is important for each individual who files an income tax return to study carefully printed instructions accompanying the tax form.

"In many instances," stated the director, "it will be found that it is generally to the advantage of the taxpayer to itemize his deductions, regardless of whether his income is under or over \$5,000 per year. Taxpayers are urged to carefully check their personal records as to possible deductible items paid through the year. These include contributions, interest payment, taxes, medical and dental expenses, child care, casualty losses and other miscellaneous items to determine if they are in excess of 10 per cent of the adjusted gross income."

"This year taxpayers are urged to study and make an effort to fill out their own returns. It will surprise many to find that they will save themselves money by learning more about how to make out and file their own Form 1040. Last year overpayments amounted to \$18,000,000," he concluded.

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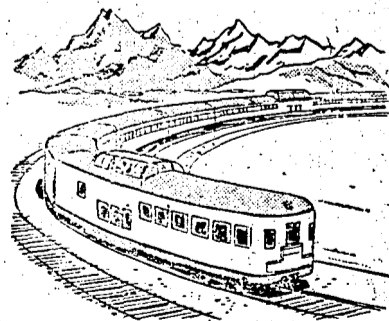
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
