

Land retired from production under the Conservation Reserve Bostwick Denied New program now may be used for certain purposes without the violation of the contract, R. J. McKenna, Bozeman, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conannounced.

McKenna explained that, even though the contract signers charge Helena. fees for the use of the Conservation acreage, the following uses of the land will be permitted without constituting a contract violation: tion acreage, the following uses of constituting a contract violation:

(1) Fishing and hunting enterfish and game for commercial his injuries. marketing; (2) camping, excluding permanent trailer courts; (3) pienicking; (4) boating; (5) riding; (6) hiking; and (7) swim-

The following additional uses will be permitted provided the contract signers do not charge or receive compensation for such uses:

(1) Community sports and athletic activities; (2) carnivals and gest. fairs; (3) meeting sites for religious, cultural, and educational groups; (4) landing areas for use by civil air patrol or noncommercial flying; (5) parades; and (6) military maneuvers.
