## Dillon Man Asks \$167,000 in Injury Action

(From Montana Standard)

A \$167,000 personal injury suit arising from a construction accident near Dillon has been filed in the Butte district court.

Larry Mitchell of Dillon is the plaintiff. Defendants include the Firestone Tire and Rubber Co. Caterpillar Tractor Co. and Galloway Sales and Service of the State of Washington.

Mitchell alleges he was injured while employed by Chert-Sandkay and Simes on June 25, 1961, when a tire on an earth mover blew up. Mitchell was unconscious for nearly a month, the complaint states.

## Ski Instructors' Clinic Scheduled Saturday, Sunday at Rainy Mountain

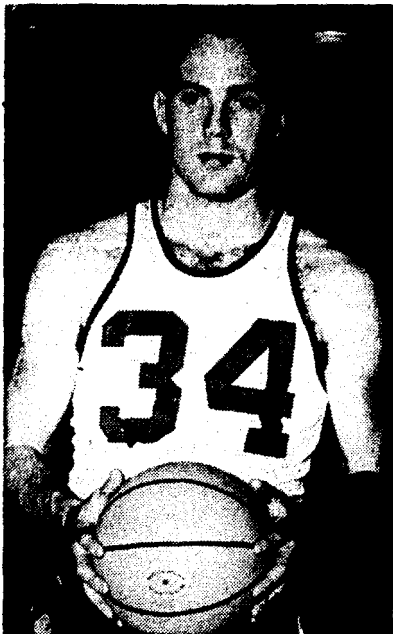

## Plans Underway to Equalize Voter Load at City's Polls

A plan to equalize voter loads at Dillon's five polling places is currently under way at the Clerk and Recorder's office in the Beaverhead courthouse.

Primary aim of the redistribution is the transfer of a portion of voters from the overloaded Guild Hall polls to the other four balloting headquarters, officials said.

Based on 1962 general election figures, Guild Hall Precinct 12 has 792 registered voters. This compares with High School Precinct 13 with 481; Metlen Hotel Precinct 14, 431; Bagley Building Precinct 1, 304; and City Hall Precinct 6, 261.

Changes are required under a state statute which limits the

number of voters to 600 at each polling place.

Chiefly concerned in the transfer will be former Guild Hall voters living south of the city limits. They will be assigned to various other polls within the city and will be notified upon completion of the project.

County officials said the redistribution plan was given preference over establishment of an additional polling place due to the heavy county expense involved by the latter alternative.

### Abolish Precinct 7

Red Rock Precinct 7, with polls at the Armstead School, will be abolished under the new plan due to the East Bench project which eventually will flood over that community.

Voters remaining in that area will be reassigned to the Dell and Grant polls while the many who have moved to Dillon will, of course, vote here.

The voter redistribution project is expected to be completed by late January.

## Veterans' Income Reporting Set One Month Earlier

Director Claude L. Meredith of the Veterans Administration Center at Fort Harrison, said Tuesday this year's income reporting time begins one month earlier than usual for 5,500 veterans and the dependents of some 3,300 deceased veterans on VA pension rolls in Montana.

Along with their Nov. 30 checks all VA pensions recipients will receive enclosed tabulating cards. They carry the words: "please do not mutilate." Meredith said it is extremely important that these instructions be followed.

On these cards beneficiaries must report all income received during 1962 and that expected in 1963.

"Income," Meredith said, means everything, including social security payments, except of course, the VA pension payments themselves.

Law requires the VA to use the reports to determine continued eligibility of pensioners and in some cases to make adjustments on the basis of increased or decreased outside income.
