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D. L. Johnson Assumes New Duties as B. C. H. S. Principal

D. L. (Clancy) Johnson today took over the duties of principal of Beaverhead county high school. Mr. Johnson was elected to the position Saturday night at a meeting of the board of trustees, who acted on the resignation of Conrad Orr. Mr. Orr resigned two weeks ago. The new principal has been a member of the faculty for the past five years.

A native of Montana, Mr. Johnson holds a B. S. degree in agricultural education from Montana State college at Bozeman and for the past 15 years has been actively engaged in school work. He taught at Chinook, Cavalier, N. Dak., and Grafton, N. Dak., before coming to Dillon in 1935. At the Beaverhead school he has been head of the vocational agriculture department, advisor of the local Future Farmers of America chapter, and served as football and assistant basketball coach.

Mr. Johnson will continue as football coach and at the present time is working with his squad of 28 men, endeavoring to whip it into shape for the opening game with the Butte Reds Sept. 13. The contest will be played at the Butte field.

TOTAL OF 469 REGISTER AT TRAINING SCHOOL

A total of 469 pupils were enrolled this morning as Dillon training schools got under way after having been closed for the three month summer period, it is announced by Superintendent Paul L. Anderson. The registration is far in advance of the number expected, the school head said, as only 445 were registered at the end of the first month last year. The total this year was expected to be considerably smaller. Probably ten or 15 more pupils will register in the next two weeks, the superintendent stated.

Superintendent Anderson begins his fourth year as administrative head of the grade system.

JOE WALL DIES SUNDAY NIGHT

Joseph Wall, sometimes known as Joe Halloran, 73-year-old Dillon resident, passed away at his cabin on North Rife street sometime Sunday night. The body was found this morning at 10:30. Mr. Wall came to Dillon 15 years ago and has been a resident of Montana for 33 years.

Born July 25, 1868 in Jackson county, Iowa, the deceased came to this state in 1908. He was employed a few years back at various ranches throughout the county as a cook. He had no relatives. The body is at the Brundage chapel and funeral arrangements have not been completed.

PIONEER STAGE DRIVER IS TAKEN BY DEATH

Joseph H. Duff, 76, a native of Montana and early day stage coach driver between Monida and Yellowstone park, succumbed at his home in Dillon Sunday following a short illness.

He was born in Helena on June 29, 1865, not far from the famous tree on which the Vigilantes of this gold-mad boom town "stretched" a few road agents and other undesirable characters. Before his marriage to Belle Pettengill in Wyoming in 1904, Mr. Duff drove stage on the line between Monida and Yellowstone park when this famous natural wonderland first began to attract tourist attention.

In years following he operated a ranch in the Centennial valley which he sold in 1929 when he retired. After living for three years in Monida, the Duffs moved to Dillon and made their home at 603 South Washington. He was a member of Dillon lodge No. 1554, B. P. O. E.

Besides his wife, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. Mayme White of Seattle; a nephew, Bert Duff of Butte; two nieces, Mrs. John Graham of Billings and Mrs. C. P. Brady of Lima, and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Jeanette Duff of Billings.

Funeral arrangements are pending.

WAR FLASHES

NAZIS CLAIM ENCIRCLEMENT OF LENINGRAD

BERLIN—Mobile units of Nazi forces advancing on Leningrad were reported to have broken through defenses around Russia's second largest city to complete the encirclement. In the sky the luftwaffe blasted away at railroads, fortifications and highways and succeeded in setting several big fires outside of Leningrad. Nazi bombers were active up and down the entire front.

PRESIDENT'S MOTHER TO 'BE BURIED TUESDAY

HYDE PARK—Private funeral services will be conducted tomorrow for Mrs. Sara Delano Roosevelt, 86, mother of the President of the United States, who died Sunday morning at the Roosevelt Hyde Park home overlooking the Hudson river. Burial will be in the family plot, beside her husband, behind the historic St. James church. President Roosevelt and his wife were with Mrs. Roosevelt when the end came. Because of the death of his mother, President Roosevelt postponed an important radio address from Monday night to Thursday night at 7 o'clock, M. S. T.

WARSHIPS SEEK GREER ATTACKER

REYJAVIK—American and British warships continued their unceasing hunt to locate the German submarine that fired on the U. S. destroyer Greer last Thursday. Some naval officers expressed the belief that the submarine was sunk by the depth charges dropped by the destroyer.

JEWS TAKEN IN PARIS AS HOSTAGES

VICHY—It was reported from Paris today that 100 Jews were being held by the Nazis as hostages for maintenance of order in the former French capital. Mounting defiance by peoples of occupied countries may give Hitler a third front this winter. General open fighting is reported in Yugoslavia between the pro-Nazi Croats and the Serbs. Germany has already assessed high fines on some cities for anti-Nazi acts.
